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# From Secretary's Desk



ALL players should take note of the approach of adjudication of their postal and e-mail tournaments. One month prior to the adjudication date they should send the status of their pending games to the TD and request for extension of the adjudication date if they feel the position is not clear.

In the following tournaments, the adjudication date is hereby extended to 30-08-2011:

7-Player Single Game:

7289, 7290, 7296, 7297, 7298, 7299, 7300, 7301, 7302

4-Player Double Game:

4297, 4298, 4300, 4306, 4307, 4308, 4310, 4311, 4312, 4313

Special Tournaments:

1802, 1803, 1805

All players in these tournaments should take note of the adjudication date and continue the games that are as yet unfinished.

In all correspondence with the TD, the players should rewrite their present e-mail ID, their Mobile or Residence number with STD code along with the time they are free for telephonic communication. Only then it will be possible for the TD to quickly resolve their difficulties. In view of the delays in postal communication the TDs prefer to communicate by e-mail, SMS or telephone.

The 15th Annual General Meeting of the members of the Federation was held on Sunday, 1st February 2009 at the residence of Dr. Ambar Chatterjee. Apart from confirmation of the minutes of the 14th AGM, approval of the reports of the Managing committee and the audited accounts for the year ending 31st March 2008, several key issues regarding the future of AICCF were discussed. It was felt that the drop in participation of members in postal tournaments was caused by the deterioration of the postal services. E-mail

and SMS have not been able to replace the immense popularity of post card play in the earlier years of AICCF. The only way to face the future would be to implement our own Webserver. Such a policy should also serve to attract the new generation who are familiar with computer based means of communication.

In any Correspondence Federation, communication is the key. If we don't have your correct postal address, the Bulletin cannot reach you. Therefore it is very urgent that you update us with any change of address. In the current regime of poor postal communication we must fall back on electronic communication, the costs for which have come down considerably. A member who does not receive the Bulletin can easily request the PDF file to be sent by e-mail. We are also trying to see if we can be more prompt in making the electronic version available at the website. Accordingly we are requesting all members to get back to us with the Contact Update Form (see p. 8 column 2). Please consider this as a very important matter and send the form back to us. If you prefer to send it by e-mail, you can send it to drambar@gmail.com.

The next National B will be held at Kolkata from August 3rd to 15th, 2009. Like last year, we again announce that AICCF will cover the fees of one AICCF member who wishes to play in the National 'B' as donor. Last year we did not get a single response from a member who was willing to participate. Those who wish to participate this year should write to me immediately. One player will be selected on the basis of rating. (see p. 9)

As per the provisions of the AICCF Constitution, elections to AICCF management committee are to take place this year. The previous election was held in 1998. Please send in your nominations in prescribed format given on the following page. The elections will be conducted by postal ballot. Anybody requiring a full list of AICCF members' addresses should contact me by post or Dr. Chatterjee by e-mail. If the list is required by e-mail, it will be sent free of cost, but if you want a printout sent by post, please send me a MO/Bank Draft/Mumbai Cheque of Rs. 50/— in favour of "All India Correspondence Chess Federation".

To play in ICCF Tournaments you must become a member of the International Section of AICCF (fees Rs. 320/- for 2 years or one time donation of Rs. 1550/-, to be sent to Shri Meherhomji). For ICCF tournaments contact **Dr. Alok Saxena** (see address in the list of TDs). One can play by e-mail or webserver (even by post, though this is not common now). The fees for the requested tournament must be sent to **Sh. Meherhomji** (Treasurer) after consulting with Dr. Saxena.

There are some ICCF tournaments like the Afro—Asia Zone Tournaments where you can play for free (see website (c) below). There are Team Tournaments such as the ICCF Olympiad (e-mail, postal or web-server) and Friendly International Tournaments, both of which are ICCF rated. Announcements regarding these are sent to members by e-mail. It is important to send your e-mail address to Dr. Saxena so that he can keep you updated on these team events.

ICCF allocates a unique ID number to you when you play in your first ICCF event. You

can locate this ID by searching at either of the ICCF Websites (a), (b).

## **ICCF Ratings**

ICCF ratings are entirely separate from AICCF ratings and are computed in a different way. Note however that games played in the AICCF Championships are also ICCF rated. An ICCF rating is given to a participant after he completes 12 games. This rating is considered provisional. A regular or fixed rating is given only after the completion of 30 games. You can find your ICCF rating at the ICCF websites (a), (b).

#### AICCF TO SPONSOR ONE PLAYER IN NATIONAL B

[The amounts mentioned in this notice (e.g. Rs. 6000/— for the donor entrance fee) are taken from last year's announcement. In case the figures have been revised we will update this notice accordingly.]

AICCF has decided to offer a sponsorship amounting to Rs. 6,000/— (or lesser amount for special category of players) to I AICCF member who wishes to play in the 47th National 'B', Kolkata, starting 3rd August.

- Any member of AICCF who wishes to participate in this National 'B' tournament and who is not representing the State Chess Association or other sports body is eligible.
- The player wishing to avail the sponsorship should contact AICCF by e-mail to drambar@gmail.com or by post to Sh. Meherhomji, (address on first page) on or before May 30, 2009. This may also be done telephonically by contacting Sh. Maherhomji at phone number 022 25896941.
- From among the sponsorship requests received, AICCF will select the player having the highest AICCF rating and inform him about the selection.
- 4. The player must contact the West Bengal State Chess Association and apply to play as a donor. He must forward his application through his own State Association and include a payment by DD of the donor fee amounting to Rs. 6,000/— on his own. If

the player belongs to North Eastern States, Andaman & Nicobar, or Jammu & Kashmir, there is a 50% concession. In that case the draft amount is Rs. 3,000/- and AICCF's sponsorship amount will also be limited to Rs. 3,000/-. For players having played previously in a National 'A' tournament, the fee is Rs. 4,200/- and in this case AIC-CF's sponsorship will be limited to this amount.

- 5. A xerox copy of the application including a xerox copy of the DD should be sent by post to Sh. Meherhomji at his usual address (see above), along with an undertaking that in case the player does not play in the National 'B' 2009, he will refund the sponsorship amount provided to him.
- 6. On receipt of item 5 above, AICCF will send a cheque/draft of Rs. 6,000/- (or less for the special categories) to the player.
- Note that the selected player will be participating in the National 'B' as an individual donor; he will not be representing AICCF. AICCF will merely be sponsoring the player to encourage his participation in a National Tournament.
- 8. AICCF's sponsorship amount is restricted to Rs. 6,000/- (Rs. 3,000/- for concessional case and Rs. 4200/- for former National 'A' players). Cost towards lodging, boarding, travel etc. are to be borne by the individual and will not be reimbursed by AICCF.

# World Women's Chess Championship, Manila 1991

THE 1991 World Women's Chess Championship was a historic event. Xie Jun defeated Maya Chiburdanidze becoming the first Asian to win the Title. For a very long time, the Soviets had dominated the Women's title and the advent of Xie triggered an awakening of Chess in China.

Xie had won the Candidates Tournament by defeating Alisa Maric in a tie-break 4.5 to 2.5 (the tie-break was required since Xie had tied with Alisa). The Manila match was held from Sep 25th to Oct 28th as the best of 16 games.

It was organized by the Philippine Sports Committee in collaboration with the City of Manila. It had been a long time since any non-soviet player had challenged the World champion and the Ladies match had anmost never been played outside the Soviet Union. So, this match was very important for Asian chess. The organizers had made good arrangements with identical facilities for the two players. The hotel rooms were identi-

cal in size and positioned at two ends of the same floor. Bodyguards were allocated to the players.

Before the match Xie was worried about preparation because Maya was well versed with modern opening theory. So Xie decided to turn her lack of understand in openings into a practical weapon. By playing boldly and originally, Xie hoped to upset her opponent.

Her delegation to the match consisted of 6 members (team-leader, his assistant, medical doctor, 2 seconds and Xie herself).

Xie got good support from her team who stayed in the playing hall throughout the duration of the game. After 10 games the score was tied 5-5. Xie started playing with more energy but Maya began to get tired. Both players became more nervous and the games were riddled with more mistakes than expected. The 14th game was the decisive which ended in a draw and left Xie with a 2 point lead with just 2 more games to go.

Xie won the match 8.5 to 6.5 (4

wins, 2 losses and 9 draws) without needing to play the last game of the match. Xie won Games 3, 8, 11 and 13. She lost Games 4 and 5.

One incident that could have proved fatal for Xie happened after Game Four. On a rest day, Xie wanted to relax in the swimming pool. She did not know how to swim, so she stayed in the shallow side of the pool. Due to the strong current in the pool, her legs got dragged to the deep end and luckily, her seconds and doctor who were with her rescued her. She had a lucky escape but was frightened badly.

After winning the match Xie found herself in the centre of popularity and media attention. Several parties were arranged and there seemed to be no end to the celebrations for bringing the title to Asia. Xie's delegation was invited to the Presidential palace to meet President Corazon Aquino. Xie was awarded the Medal of Honour from the President.

Back in China also, Xie received an incredible reception. She was invited to the City Hall to give a series of interviews and press conferences.

Xie has been primarily responsible for popularising Chess in China. The Media started considering it as a true sport and players got more publicity than before.

# Chess a stimulant, perfect cure for depression

Readers may be interested to read the following interview featuring our President, **Dr. A.B. Surveyor** published in 1999 but so relevant in today's ever stressful life...

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**SEPTEMBER 12:** For A living, he sets your teeth right. But challenge him to a game of chess, he is likely to chew you up.

He is no ordinary chess player. Dr. Aspi B. Surveyor has won the National title in correspondence chess *ten* times (70-86, 89-91).

The correspondence chess Nationals is played over 18 months with one move every three days. As the name suggests, players exchange moves by post-cards. To ensure that the competition finishes in time, each player takes on the other 15 simultaneously. That means receiving and sending replies to 15 post cards in three days.

Dr. Surveyor, who apart from being a Consultant Oral Diagonistician is also an author of 12 plays, poems and books, believes there is more to chess than just making clever moves.

He quotes two great chess players Tarrasch and Alekhine to hammer in his belief.

"A person is a fool if he is totally ignorant of chess, like the pleasures of love," Dr Surveyor quotes Tarrasch. Alekhine said: "Chess is among the most intellectually stimulating activities if not the most."

Though the doctor does not play any more, he studies the game on a regular basis. "Even studying the game stimulates me," he says.

With the National Correspondence championships not being held for several years, Dr. Surveyor is busy setting up a new body The *All India* 

Correspondence Chess Federation. He had won the title when the championships were being conducted by the earlier body the Correspondence Chess Association of India.

He recalls his playing days. "As the tournament progressed, my sleeping hours would decrease. Some days, I would barely manage two hours from 4:00am to 6:00am before heading for the hospital. Some nights I would not sleep, analysing games through the night!"

The triumphs over the years have given him another title the best analyser of a given position. And his analysis takes him deep into the game. Like the time he spent 40 hours over a single move. "The opponent was Ramanathan from Mysore. Another player, H.J. Samtani, and I were neck-and-neck in the race for the title. I needed a win against Ramanathan and the move that he gave me was a draw. So I sat through on a Saturday afternoon, the whole of that day, the next day (Sunday) before finding a win late in the night."

But his passion has one peril. The game gets adjourned if it does not get over in the stipulated period. "The game then goes to the expert and he may not understand the position always and grant your opponent a win when a draw is a sure result. To avoid this, I have sometimes not chosen the best alternative as it may prolong the outcome. I have compromised on best move so that the result is faster."

Though correspondence chess, like the ongoing Garry Kasparov vs World

match on the net is impersonal, some of the participants manage to add to it a personal element. "In addition to their moves, some players write abuses, some poetry. Many reveal their disillusionment, some talk about having attempted suicide," he says. Dr. Surveyor has a piece of advice for all those comtemplating suicide — play chess. "You learn how to avoid the traps. You find a way out of your troubles."

#### Correspondence Chess—The format

Sixteen players qualify for the Nationals. To qualify, a player must compete in the National B where the top four players from the three groups qualify and they join the four seeds from the previous National championships.

A player has to make a move within three days. A day is counted when you receive a letter in the afternoon and send his move by 4:00 pm the next day. If he sends the reply by the same afternoon, he saves all his three days.

In effect a player has to send and receive ten letters from one player each month. Of course, he plays 15 players simultaneously over several months! One tournament lasts over a 18-month period.

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You are for me the Queen on d8 and I am the Pawn on d7!!

Dear Editor,

If we want members to take interest in CC, then we should also give

them information from the CC field. So our Bulletin should be dedicated primarily to CC. When I started "Corchegimmic" it stood for "Correspondence Chess Gimmic". Obviously, positions only from CC games should appear under this caption. If you want to write about leading chess players of the world, please write only about the leading CC players of the world. How many members might be aware of who is the current World CC Champion? It is AICCF's duty to educate them in this. When we are trying to promote CC, our dedication to it must be seen, and the medium for it is our Bulletin. So the Bulletin should give material only related to CC. Instead of publishing articles on OTB players and activities, we should give information about CC players and their games/activities from all over the world. We should talk about the World CC Championship and CC Champions of other countries. Recently World CC Champion played a game against The World and, I think, lost it. Such interesting news should have appeared in our Bulletin. Now another game also is in progress. Members should be asked to send their moves. They should be taught the process for it. Such an approach may enrich their interest in CC (and AICCF).

Please permit me to give here an illustration: A mother and father are going out to see a movie leaving their little son behind. While going out of the house, they warn the son to do his studies and not to go out of the house. What would be effect of their warning on the son? In all probabil-

ity he will ignore it. Why? Because the boy did not see his parents' sincerity towards him. If the parents want their son to study, they too should remain along with him doing some sincere work like reading, etc. If we want others to take interest in CC, we, the seniors, ourselves must take and show our interest in CC. And the proper medium for it is our Bulletin. There is no point in eulogising OTB players thru our Bulletin. There are umpteen chess magazines to do that.

I am aware of the large volume of work involved in editing and publishing a Bulletin. And the AICCF editor is doing all this free of charge and at the cost of his family engagements. I will therefore never crib about the delay in publication. However, the editor should also realize his/her limitations and should not be unnecessarily overambitious like trying to print the Bulletin every quarter. That is why I had maintained the frequency as half-yearly. (That too I had found taxing!). Publishing the Bulletin in time should obviously be the major consideration in deciding the frequency of the Bulletin.

# Players Woes

Dear Editor,

We should think about why people withdrew in CC games in the past. To me this is due to the fact that some of the TDs blindly applied the rules which benefited cheats and recalcitrants. Moreover the dictum that *Rules are for Players* was ignored and *Players are for Rules* was followed. In one of my championship games, the opponent blundered a piece due to writing mistake so I

offered him the chance to correct his move. Instead I received a reminder to which I replied under UPC. Meanwhile the player lodged a claim which was awarded. I wrote to the TD giving details of my game and UPC etc. but the TD did not reconsider or refer the matter to the Appeals Committee. Similarly in the same Championship there were some instances where chronic defaulters were rewarded because they knew how to exploit rules. Rating chasers are the biggest culprits of CC. In my tenure as TD I always strived for a game to be decided on the board rather than at my desk, at some (temporary) inconvenience to some players. It is time to identify such persons and take swift action.

# The Computer Demon

Dear Editor,

CC is losing its sheen because of the advent of computer software programs. A player knows he is playing against his opponent's computer. Otherwise how one can one explain the good performance in CC by weaker OTB players? You are beaten by the opponent's computer. That loses the charm of playing. It ultimately boils down to why one plays CC: to win or to enjoy the game? In this regard my article published (in the late 80's) in G.P. Suman's CCAI Bulletin is relevant. (One CCAI member was irritated over my forthright observations in that article. But that was because certain of them applied to him!).

The use of computers for CC (both for AICCF and ICCF) is now perfectly legal and in fact no play at the upper level of CC can be imagined without computer analysis. It is no longer relevant to comment about the 'fun of CC' being lost because you are playing the opponents computer. Rather you should focus on how you can make intelligent use of computer engines yourself. The aim is to search for deep strategies and pose challenges for the opponent. The tactics are best checked by computer. So in a way CC has become more creative and more of a challenge by the advent of computers rather than the other way around. Perhaps it is hard to convince everyone and at least one more member (see letter below) is so upset with computer use that he has stopped playing CC altogether! Those who use computers a lot in other creative work such as engineers and scientists (like myself) perceive the computer as just a tool, the REAL thinking has still to be done by the human player. -Ed.

# Dear Editor,

I do not play chess by correspondence though I am an AICCF Member. I used to play until 4 years ago till I learnt that anyone can make use of engines/software. My idea is just as players play OTB on their own, in CC they should play exclusively on their own, the only difference being that in OTB the player

makes the actual move and in CC the player sends his move by post/e-mail/SMS/Fax etc. I use engine only to analyse interesting games which I like, so that I can enjoy/understand the tactics better.

In a website referred by Mr. Dhanish to me, there is one piquant remark by Nunn, *Correspondence chess is computer vs. computer*.


[Nunn is an OTB player and may never have played CC. Generally speaking OTB players do not understand the pleasures of CC and this was true even before the advent of computer chess engines.

— Ed.]

Nunn may not have played correspondence chess and may not have experienced the 'pleasure' of it but the point is that good OTB players are not in anyway inferior in understanding chess as compared to good CC players, though they may lack the devotion/patience required to analyse the game at every single move to the limits. And it is precisely here that the engine plays the spoiler's role. By using the engine all are at par and only above a certain level, the understanding of chess begins to tell. Not everyone who plays CC manages to become among the strongest even after having the best engine at his disposal. But such persons are among the very few, and hence for the majority of CC players, it becomes computer vs. computer.

Incidentally, at the chessbase.com website you can find Anand's interesting remarks about computers in chess.

I refer to the study Costeff (2009) given at chessbase.com:



White to play and draw

My computer Fritz 11 looked at it in Analysis mode for a long time showing -+ (advantage for Black). This shows that Fritz (and other engines which I tried) lack genuine 'understanding' of chess. But the study may be solved by a good analyst/strong player who has a firstclass understanding. If such a player were to play CC he would not use the computer. So I think CC should be played by only those persons who: i) first analyse the position deeply and ii) then may or may not use the computer. Even if the engine shows a different opinion, he should stick to his own opinion. Such a person would not be handicapped at all even if he has no access to the best engine in the world.

We give here the reply of P.B.Dhanish: Dear Mr. Modak,

You have provided one position where a computer was not able to find the best move. Similarly I can

also provide positions where computers can find the best move in seconds, but human beings cannot, even in several days. So this does not prove anything.

Anyway, this topic has been discussed umpteen number of times, please see a recent discussion on the ICCF Forum: http://www.iccf.com/forum/showthread.php?t=2353

A detailed comparison of the relative strengths of Computers vs. Humans is given in the first chapter of the book *Modern Chess Analysis* by Robin Smith, twice US correspondence chess champion.

The Editor replied to Shri Modak explaining how ICCF came to the decision to allow the use of computers in CC because one cannot control the use

of computers in privacy. After that, over a decade has passed. Today's CC players are comfortable in using engines as a tool to check their ideas (especially tactics), but realize that strategy and planning require deeper insight. The truth is that in a given position, the computer may suggest several equally good alternatives, but in the game you have to make only one choice. In AICCF we delayed the official acceptance of engines because computers were out of reach for many. But in 2005 (see the AICCF Bulletin, Feb 2005, p. 1, 37) AICCF followed the stand taken by ICCF and other national CC federations worldwide and officially allowed the use of computer search engines for CC in AICCF tournaments.

Shri Modak is not impressed by our arguments. However, for our other members and players worldwide, CC remains the enduring sport it always was.

## **Question To You**

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IN mid-February, we circulated an e-mail to all members whose e-mail address was available with us asking an opinion about the future direction of AICCF. The discussion on this topic is not closed... we urge you to send your response to the editor by e-mail or post (*address on first page*). We particularly need the response of members who do not have e-mail

(and also members whose e-mail address is not available with us).

#### The question asked was:

Should AICCF implement its own webserver? If so, should postal play also be continued? Could the running fees for the AICCF webserver be recovered by charging a nominal tournament entry fee for each webserver tournament?

Here are some of the responses we received:

Dear Editor,

It is time for AICCF to move on to Webserver so that the TD's work can be eased. Also if someone like Shri Shams Khan can take up Webserver play, I do not see why others cannot follow suit. Internet is available in every nook and corner of the country and should not pose a problem to any correspondence chess player (in my humble opinion) — despite a little cost if one does not have PC at home as also internet connection.

This will also force players who play 'only to create trouble' to exit. Such players have already impacted others including me to give up playing other than on Webserver (we play for the sake of our interest in chess and not for this kind of 'warfare'). Also I do not believe that 'naming and shaming' such players will lead to desired results.

The next issue is the cost of Webserver and I would prefer players to bear the cost. Donations from members for setting up the webserver could be invited. We can also charge players for their participation on webserver but this has to be nominal charge.

In my opinion, SMS play for Correspondence Chess is not the right way for AICCF.

Dear Editor,

The decision about continuing or

phasing out postal play may be taken after obtaining due concurrence from all the members through a questionnaire. The members could reflect their views for and against and the majority of opinions of members to be taken as the apt one.

Should AICCF implement its own web server? Yes indeed!. The expenses may be meted out of onetime subscription from all members for setting up of facilities. The amount may be decided after consulting members through bulletin/individual mail.

One year is too long period for AICCF to setup its webserver! We should expedite the matter. Till that is set up, we may conduct the next AICCF Championship on ICCF's server.

Please ponder whether our web server could derive some income from advertisements. Secondly, can we get some sponsors, who for the sole sake of chess are able to shelve out some money! Can we find some donors? (Mr.KVLN is a role model).

If we cannot find adequate fees for web serve then I suggest collecting some nominal fees for web server tournaments. The amount may be spelt out clearly in advance for agreement by members.

Some members can use the free SMS facility given by the mobile service provider. Hence for them, SMS play is beneficial and free of price tag. Even otherwise, the cost is affordable to players who opted for SMS play. One also has to accommodate players in the larger interest of chess with the handicap of not having e-mail facility.

Switching on computers is always beneficial as one need not to arrange chess board manually. At the fag end, it is the interest /willingness/choice of the players that prevail on the ways to use their facilities they possess.

According to me, the debate 'whether e-mail chess or postal chess?' is unnecessary (and also unhealthy). Both should survive. Any form, other than OTB, should be promoted by AICCF — be it post, e-mail, SMS, telegraph, telephone, or whatever. Nothing should be anathema. This flexibility is absolutely essential for the survival of the AICCF. Here I remember the quote: Throw the tyranny of 'or' and embrace the genius of 'and'! We must change our stance from 'this or this' to 'this and this'. Separate tournaments can be and should be arranged for each category, and I agree there should not be mix up in the same tournament.

Playing the game thru e-mail is felt very clumsy. (I too still feel that way!) One has to keep switching on the PC to know the move and then again to post the reply. In India, still today, it is felt burdensome. Many do not possess yet their own PCs. The supply of electricity is becoming erratic day by day. (To know its agony, one must go and stay outside

Mumbai). But I realize one has to be open to change and cannot swim against the tide. We should try to make e-mail chess more and more popular. But 'postal chess' need not be stopped altogether. Those who wish to play thru post should be allowed to do so. We need not look down upon them — at least in our country. If the postal services are irregular they are paying for its consequences. If affordable, one may resort to courier service. But one cannot deny that there are certain advantages of 'postal chess' over 'e-mail chess'.

I appreciate your readiness to put up webserver for AICCF. I am not at all against webserver play. In today's world, it has to be promoted. No two opinions about it. But, at the same time, if a few members want to play by post or by e-mail or SMS, they should be allowed to do so in separate tourneys arranged for each category. Majority of the tourneys shall be through webserver only.



# **Kiss of Queen**


A new chess variant invented by world no. 5 **GM Vassily Ivanchuk** 

JUST forty and currently doing very well in his career, GM Vassily Ivanchuk invented an interesting variant of chess. In this new game Queen's vulnerability is more than the king. According to him it will tight rope the drawn results of the game. All the rules of his proposed variant are like normal chess apart from these:


- 1. Pawn can be promoted into rook, bishop and knight only. So no queen promotion. [D1]
- Queen can not be taken. So no queen sacrifice is allowed. Any move which left the queen enprise is illegal. [D2]
- 3. Any attack to the queen is treated as check. So one can win by checkmating the enemy queen also. [D3]
- 4. Simultaneous attack (knight fork, skewer etc.) on king and queen is called "*Harem Mate*". [D4]
- 5. If there is no piece of the queen's own side standing on an adjacent square, she is said to be "naked". At that time any enemy piece may approach her, "kiss" her and win the game. If the only cover is king then except for king, any other piece can "kiss" her. [D5]
- 6. But queen can approach to the enemy king if supported. [D6] Examples for above rules are:



Here 1.d8=R, 1.d8=B and 1.d8=N is possible but 1.d8=Q is illegal.



White cannot play 5.Bb5 pinning the Knight because white queen is in check.



White can checkmate by 5.Ne6!#.








White can deliver mate by I.ReI# (Skewer) or I.Nf5# (fork), hence *Harem Mate.*)

to cover (King) of White Queen. But I...Kc2 or I...Kc1 is illegal, as cover is King. And also I...Rh1 wins by "Harem Mate".



White Queen can checkmate the Black King by 4.Qf7# as she is protected by White Bishop and no other Black piece.

# 8th AICCF Championship, 1508

THE 8th AICCF Championship will be started around July 2009. Unlike previous championships, this Championship will be a landmark for AICCF in that it will be played exclusively by Webserver. We will be taking up ICCF's offer which allows one webserver tournament to be hosted at the ICCF webserver free of cost for each member country. We envisage a 15 player tournament, as is the usual practice for AICCF Championships, however should there be less than 15 entries we will organise the tournament with a lesser number. Again, as usual we are providing 2 seats as donor entries, that is, 2 seats can be filled by players who do not qualify on the basis of ratings but are willing to play as donors.

The decision to have the 8th Championship played by Webserver has been in our mind since long. In fact it was a seriously considered option for 1507. However, at the time 1507 was started, we were worried that perhaps several players would not have access to Internet and so the current championship, 1507 was played as a mixed E-mail and postal event. The experience of the play in the tournament was also mixed. There was an early withdrawal from the tournament by S.M. Ravi Prakash ostensibly for personal reasons, but we suspect that like many of our members he was fed up of the postal delays, sending reminders by UPC, keeping records and other mundane tasks. T. Pawan Kumar also withdrew at an early stage. The worst experience, from AICCF's point of view was the controversial decision that had to be taken regarding stalwart player and past AICCF Champion S.K.Somani. Somani

elected to play by post although he was definitely a user of e-mail. The postal delivery at Indore could be a reason for the back and forth reminders, claims and counter claims which were causing much heartache for the TD to resolve. However, Somani was also ignoring the friendly reminders being sent to him by e-mail, possibly because he had limited e-mail access. Things reached such a stage that AICCF finally decided to stop all the games of Somani treating them as lost. Another matter was that several players opted to play by post despite being e-mail users. The postal games were progressing at snails pace while those played by e-mail were getting over quickly. This is not a desirable feature in any competition.

Several of the postal games actually ended in claims being upheld though the concerned players were continuing other games, indicating that they were not out of the circuit. All in all, there were many games that were decided outside of actual play on the chessboard.

Our decision to opt for the next championship on webserver may be unfriendly for members without Internet access; however our survey indicates that the bulk of members would prefer to play on the webserver. This would bring in several benefits to the players and also to the AICCF management. The players would be freed of the irritation of postal delays and could concentrate on the quality of the game. They would be freed of the hassle of sending reminders, especially reminders by UPC requiring trips to the post office. The AICCF management would be freed of having to take difficult decisions on claims. In short, games would be decided on the chess board and not outside of it.

By now most of our members will be familiar with ICCF's webserver. Nevertheless, for the convenience of our readers we present below a list of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ):

### I. What is CC Webserver?

Webserver is a way of playing correspondence chess, where the players are presented with a simple graphical screen showing the position of the game where they can make their move by dragging a piece with the mouse. The software ensures that only legal moves can be made. To prevent unintended moves from being transmitted by mistake, the user is required to press a confirmatory button. All the clerical work of maintaining the game scores and time indications are automated on the server. These details are preserved after logout and always accessible later. The user does not have to maintain any time records.

You connect to the website http://www.icef-webchess.com. After that the next step is to authenticate yourself by login (to ensure that someone else does not move the pieces on your behalf!). The login requirement is to provide your ICCF ID and Password. At the time when the tournament starts you will receive an e-mail in which your ICCF ID and password will be pro-

vided (you can change the password at any time). In case you forget your ICCF ID, the login screen has the possibility to click "If you forgot your ICCF ID, find it here". If you forgot your password, that too will reach you by e-mail when you request it.

After successful login, you can click "Games list" which then takes you to the screen from where you can navigate to a particular game. If it is your turn, you can make your move. You can logout at any point with or without making moves.

# 2. Is there any online help or tutorial available?

Yes. Its there on the sever website itself. It provides information in sufficient detail. You can start with the tutorial and then read all the individual help topics.

# 3. Do I require any special hardware or software? Do I need high speed internet? Can I use an Internet Café?

No extra software or hardware is required beyond a computer connected to Internet. High speed internet access is not required. Any type of connection will do. You can easily send your moves from any Internet café.

### 4. What if my computer crashes or my internet service is not working?

A computer crash or an internet problem at any point, including a sudden crash when you were in the process of sending a move, has no effect. It is equivalent to a logout. You can simply connect again. In case of a computer crash you can continue your games from another computer, from an Internet Café, from a friend's computer or simply wait (if you have enough time) for the repair of your computer.

# 5. What if the ICCF Webserver goes down?

Server crashes are very rare, but when it happens, the ICCF team attends to it very quickly. The time lost during the period when you were not able to transmit your move is credited back to you.

### 6. Can I take leave?

Yes. Checkout "How to Book Holidays and Request Special Leaves" in online help.

# 7. What happens if I am traveling in India or abroad?

Just use Internet from anywhere, your own laptop, an office computer, a cyber café. This is a great advantage with the webserver. You don't even need to carry any record of your games.

# 8. Are there any computer security aspects or any other worries?

Using the ICCF Websever is as secure as any authenticated site and does not entail any additional security issues over normal internet usage. There are no programs to be downloaded and installed.

# ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE 8TH AICCF CHAMPIONSHIP, 1508 (2009-10)

- 1. The 8th AICCF Championship, 1508 will be a 15-player single game Round Robin tournament commencing around July 2009.
- 2. The Championship will be played on the ICCF Webserver. The rules and regulations of the ICCF Webserver will apply. The time limit will be 50 days per every 10 moves (a new rule of "time duplication" as mentioned by ICCF may also be applied see p 46).
- 3. A suitable tournament director will be appointed as necessary, however the role of the TD is extremely limited and so it should be possible for one of the participating players to act as TD with the proviso that Special Leave applications will be granted only in consultation with the AICCF Management Committee.
- 4. The Entry Fee is Rs. 100/- for those qualifying on the basis of Rating or Seeding and Rs. 1200/- for donor entries.
- 5. To be eligible to play in this Championship, the player must be either a donor/life member or must have paid his subscription up to 31 December 2010. Applications along with the requisite fee and subscription (if not already paid) must be sent (preferably by Registered Post or courier) so as to reach the Hon. Secretary, Shri E.G. Meherhomji before 31 May 2009. In case you are not sure of being selected, it is possible to send your entry with an assurance that if selected, you will send the requisite fees within 1 week of being requested.
- 6. From the requests received, the top 12 players according to rating on 1 January 2009 (as published in this Bulletin and subject to any correction) will be selected. The Secretary will inform them and follow up by Registered Post if required.
- 7. The entry fee of Rs. 100/- will be refunded to those who send the fees but are not selected.
- 8. AICCF Champion, P.B. Dhanish is directly qualified to play in this championship and he can send his entry by 31 May 2009 along with the fee of Rs. 100/—. In case he does not opt to play, the next highest rated applicant will be selected.
- 9. Two places are reserved for donor entries. Donor/Life members or those who have paid the subscription up to 31 December 2010, can make an application to play as a donor entry by paying Rs. 1200/- to All India Correspondence Chess Federation latest by 31 May 2009. If more than 2 donor entry applications are received, 2 will be selected in the following order of preference: (a) Donor Member (b) Life Member (c) Rating as on

- 1 January 2009 (d) Draw of lots. The Secretary will refund Rs. 1200/- to applicants thus eliminated.
- 10. If there are less than 2 applications for Donor entries, the next eligible player(s) on the basis of Rating will be included.
- 11. If less than 15 players apply, such lesser number shall constitute the field.
- 12. The winner of this Championship will be seeded for the Championship starting after this Championship is over.
- 13. The games will be AICCF and ICCF rated. At the conclusion of the Championship, ties if any, will be resolved in the following order: (a) FIDE tie breaking system (b) Results of the tied players against each other (c) Player who has scored more wins (d) Players who scored more wins with Black pieces (e) Toss of coin.
- 14. Prospective players may point out any discrepancies in the above announcement and these will be corrected subsequently.

An informal e-mail was circulated among members to gauge the response for webserver-1508 and we received favorable responses from several players. However we are now making the formal announcement as above and you must send your willingness to participate by sending a Registered Letter/ Courier along with fees to Sh. E.G. Meherhomji.

# **ICCF President Resigns**

MED Samraoui, ICCF President and a friend of AICCF for long years and contributor to the AICCF Bulletin resigned from the post of ICCF President. We give below his resignation letter and our reply to him:

Dear friends,

With deep sadness I must inform you that I have taken the decision to resign from my function of ICCF President with immediate effect.

It was not easy to take such a decision, particularly after having served ICCF in various positions for 30 years. ICCF was my second family and I devoted the most part of my free time to Correspondence Chess. Thanks to ICCF I have had many friends all around the world, and ICCF Congresses were for me unforgettable moments where I could meet some of them and to share with them agreeable times.

As you may remember, since ICCF Congress in Benalmadena 2007, my life was affected by this tragedy and if I continued, it is only because several friends, the delegates and the members of ICCF Executive Board have brought me a strong support. Last year I was unable to attend ICCF Congress in Pleven and at the current date, I am not even sure if I could attend ICCF Congress in Leeds. During Congresses the President should conduct the debates, explain his plans and develop his strategy to Congress. Being absent is a handicap which I cannot tolerate.

Furthermore, health problems and frequent visits to hospitals have also reduced my free time. So in these conditions, I must be honest and must give a chance to another friend to continue to lead ICCF to the prosperity.

During the three last years, many realizations have been achieved. – ICCF server is permanently improved. – Finances are in the growth phase and totally under control, thanks to the great work made by Carlos Flores, Soeren Peschardt and Michael Millstone. – Several sponsors have been approached and are supporting ICCF activities, besides ChessBase and New in Chess, we have now signed agreements in 2008 and 2009 with Chesspublishing, Opening Master and Chess Informant; that means that our players will receive prizes in all major ICCF tournaments. Further contacts with other sponsors

are still in discussion. A big thank you to Eric Ruch and Gino Figlio for their efforts. – New events introduced since 2007, like Money Prize Tournaments, Rapid CC, Blitz CC, School events, Junior World Cup and Veteran World Cup attracted many new players and have been very successful. – Young and competent officials are very well integrated and I am very proud to have "talents" like Valer Demian as NTTC, Marco Caressa who are doing a magnificent work to help the World Tournament Director.

Unfortunately I have had no time to implement all my promises, but I do hope that my successor will continue in the way already traced. I have also decided to stop my CC career and I am very fortunate that my last tournament was the Memorial Henk Mostert, a true friend of mine, who was an example for me because he was a person who believed strongly in ICCF motto "Amici sumus".

Thanks to all the friends who supported me and my actions to develop ICCF and very sorry if my decision seems brutal or shocking.

ICCF has published its January 2009 "Top 201" Rating List. Joop In this list, J van Osteram (NED) is at the top with a formidable rating of 2735 followed by Hans-Marcus Elwert (GER) with 2724 as a close second.

There are 129 GMs, 52 SMs, 8 IMs, and 12 Untitled players.

The list is dominated by the Europeans. GER leads with its, as many as, 42 players, followed by ITA 12, NED 10, RUS and CZE 9 each.

Latin America has put up a good show with 17 players, the break-up of which is: BRA 8, ARG 4, MEX, URU, CHI, COL and GUA one each.

On this background, the performance of the Indian sub-continent is poor with only one player in the List of Top 200. (PAK, SRI, BAN, and NEP are not even members of ICCF).

But do you know who that only player is?

He is our own P.B. Dhanish from Kerala who won, in 2008, the 7th National CC Chp of AICCF. His ICCF rating is 2557. He is untitled and stands a creditable 194th in the world! Dhanish has really made AICCF and India proud. Hope he acquires a CC title soon. Good luck and best wishes, Dhanish!
